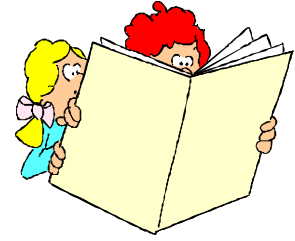

List of Optional Activities

(Based on Hawaii Content and Performance Standards III)

1. **Draw a picture of your favorite part of the story and state the reason for your choice.**
2. **Create something in another form or medium that represents your favorite part of the story (puppet, diorama, bookmark, song, etc.). Include a written explanation of your product. Label your 3-D projects with your name and room number.**
3. **Explain what literary form this story represents, is it a folk tale, fable, myth, legend, tall tale, a combination, etc. AND state the characteristics and examples from the text that justify your decision (for example, this is a fable because it has a moral, which says...).**
4. **Interpret the theme or author's message and relate it to something in our present day life. You may use a graphic organizer such as a Venn Diagram to show the comparison.**
5. **Share your opinion: Why do you think this story is told from one generation to another.**
6. **Respond by connecting the author's craft to its effect on the reader (for example does the plot ring true, are the characters believable, is the ending justified).**
